

Firstly, we'd like to say it's been a fantastic first week back settling into routine after the festive period. We have loved hearing all about the children's time with their families. Yarmer Reception / Year One

It has been such a magical and busy week. We were all so excited to see a light dusting of snow and have enjoyed discovering ice and other signs of winter within our outside area. The reception children were thrilled to be spending their first forest school session of the year enjoying the snow. They made the most of it by working as a team to collect the snow in buckets and punnets to create snow bricks. They rolled in it, caught it on their tongues, made and threw snowballs and fully embraced the cold. Back in school we have spent time looking at the book 'Whatever Next'. The reception children decided to paint their own rockets and have thought about what they might take with them if they went on an adventure to space. Within our maths learning, the year ones have been exploring numbers between 10 – 20. They have learnt that these numbers are made up of tens and ones. Within their science learning, the year ones have been leaning about whether something is living or non-living. They had a long discussion about fire because although it demonstrates lots of life-like characteristics, it is of course not living. The children found this fascinating!
