A message from Mrs Sims-Stirling

<u>Unauthorised absence requests</u>: You will see from our class attendance percentages in this bulletin that the week before half term was very poor. I wanted to share the below information with you again.

We believe that in order for a pupil to fully benefit from their education, good attendance is crucial. It is the policy of our school to celebrate achievement and full attendance is a critical factor to a productive and successful school career.

A family holiday is not normally considered by the Government to be an 'exceptional circumstance' and therefore will not be authorised by this school. I must take this opportunity to remind you, that should you choose to take your child out of school without the authorisation of the school, then Parental Responsibility Measures could be instigated. This could mean receiving any of the following;

- · A Penalty Notice
- \cdot A summons to the Magistrate Court which could result in a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a term of imprisonment for up to 3 months.

Should a Penalty Notice be issued as a result of unauthorised absence then one notice will be issued to each parent/carer for each child involved. Currently, each Penalty Notice is for £120, which is reduced to £60 if paid within the first 21 days. If a Penalty Notice goes unpaid after 28 days, then court proceedings will be initiated.

Welcome back to second half of the spring term. It has been so lovely to see all the children's bright, happy faces and hear tales of exciting half terms. The break away from school has re-set the children's focus and determination towards their learning. We have shuffled around the RWI groups again (this happens every half term), and have been stretching our brains and begun leaning about place value of numbers to 50 within our maths. The Year 1s have shown me how brilliant they are at counting in 10s and creating groups of 10s and 1s to count large groups of objects. The Reception children have begun to deepen their understanding of number to 10 and how to use the whole-part model. This week, I have challenged the children to really think about their letter and number formation - I have been so impressed with how neat, tidy and uniform their writing is becoming.
