Yarmer Reception / Year One

This Week

Thank you to the brilliant Miss Symons for organising an amazing science day on Monday. Each year we celebrate 'British Science Week' by hosting a day of fun filled activities based around a scientific theme. This year the theme was 'change and adapt.' The children spent the day within their family groups rotating around each of the classrooms and participating in different experiments and activities.

The activates included:

'DEEP SEA YOGA': This activity engaged the children in a fun and educational game that combined physical movement with learning about marine life and their adaptations. It promoted both physical wellness and environmental awareness.

'AMAZING ANIMAL ADAPTATIONS!': How do polar bears survive in such chilly climates without freezing? How do tigers sneak up on their prey without being heard? Within this activity the children explored some of the remarkable adaptations that allow animals to thrive in different habitats around the world.
'PLAYGROUND GAMES': This activity was designed to get the children thinking about how games can be adapted to include disabled children. They learnt about the effects of limited vision and other disabilities and designed games that accommodated the needs of different players.

'TABLETOP GLACIERS': The children explored how Antarctica is home to some of the largest and oldest glaciers on Earth. They looked at the impact that water contact and changes in temperature have on glaciers through their own icy experiments.

'SHOULD WE FLUSH IT AWAY?' The children were posed the question: What can we flush away apart from pee and poo? They learnt that items like wet wipes do not breakdown in water so when they are flushed down the toilet they mix with grease in the sewer and form massive solids called fatbergs. The children Investigated which items change and breakdown easily in water so can be flushed away.
